Core CivicScore Questions

Use these to generate the actual CivicScore output.

- “What’s the CivicScore for {City, State}?”
- “What’s the CivicScore for ZIP code {#####}?”
- “Can you update the CivicScore for {City} this month?”
- “How has the CivicScore for {City} changed recently?”

Comparison & Context Questions

Use these to understand differences across places or time.

- “How does {City A} compare to {City B} on CivicScore?”
- “Why is the CivicScore higher in {City} than in nearby cities?”
- “Which cities have the highest civic stress right now?”
- “Is {City} trending better or worse than similar cities?”

Metric-Specific Questions

Use these to zoom in on one part of the score.

- “Why does chronic illness increase economic stress in the score?”
- “Which age groups are most affected by autoimmune conditions here?”

Policy & Leadership Questions

Use these to identify accountability and policy drivers.

- “Which recent policies are hurting or helping this CivicScore?”
- “What federal or state actions are increasing civic stress here?”
- “Who are the elected officials tied to this CivicScore?”
- “Which level of government is having the biggest impact?”

Equity & Impact Questions

Use these to understand who is most affected.

- “Which populations are most impacted in this CivicScore?”
- “How does this CivicScore affect disabled residents?”
- “Why are women over 50 showing up as highly impacted?”
- “How does this score reflect lived experience, not just data?”

Communication & Advocacy Questions

Use these after a CivicScore is generated.

- “Can you write a social media post about this CivicScore?”
- “Make this CivicScore understandable to everyday residents.”



- “Turn this CivicScore into a short explainer for the public.”
- “Can you generate a CivicScore image for sharing?”

Method & Interpretation (High-Level Only)

Use these to understand meaning, not mechanics.

- “What does a CivicScore of 45 actually mean for daily life?”
- “Is a lower CivicScore always good?”
- “Why doesn’t economic growth automatically lower the score?”
- “How should advocates or journalists interpret this score?”
